Hundreds Installed at Tepeyac Ceremony

The Tepeyac Institute was founded in 1988 to enable the laity to take their rightful role in the mission and ministry of the Church. For the past 30 years over 30,000 persons from throughout the diocese have participated in our Tepeyac programs.

The Institute provides a twopart formation program the Christian Formation Program (CFP) and the Ministry Formation Program (MFP). The CFP offers a solid theological framework for ministry based on the vision of Vatican II, scripture, the Catechism of the Catholic Church, and the teachings of Pope Francis. The MFP offers more of the practicum needed by participants in their ministry. These ministerial practica are divided into the categories of Priest, Prophet and King. Tepeyac also offers a Summer Institute during the month of June with local and visiting faculty.

The courses are taught at the Tepeyac Institute facilities at the Diocesan Pastoral Center although Tepeyac has offered programs at most of the parishes in the diocese. Over the years, the response from the people and the support of their pastors has been overwhelming. This year, for example, Bishop Mark J. Seitz installed over 750 ministers for service in our diocese.

Our Bible Study Certification has been very successful offered in coordination with the Instituto Biblico San Francisco. This is a three-year program of biblical study. This year we had the first graduates in the program: 7 parishioners who completed the program successfully.

Tepeyac also offers an Adult Formation Program, which is a three-year program with 12 courses with some of the top theologians of the diocese who teach Christology, Social Justice, Moral Ethics, The Gospels, Old Testament, and other courses. We have been graduating participants for the past 9 years, and this year we graduated seven people.

As Tepeyac continues to grow, it continues to offer ministry formation programs based on the needs of the parishes. Our Mourning and Accompaniment program is a good example. This year we graduated a large group for service in our parishes.

On April 28 Tepeyac celebrated the Installation as Ministers by Bishop Seitz at St. Mark Church. The opening words of our bishop were: "Wow, is there anyone else left in El Paso?" The church was packed with ministers and their families. They came to be installed and missioned by the bishop. After the special installation ceremony, the newly installed ministers picked up their certificates and ID cards. As

we were processing out of the parish, the church bells rang and the Mariachi Son de Mexico was welcoming the ministers to the Guadalupe Shrine where they presented flowers to the Virgin.



Youth Ministry and Pastor of Buen Pastor Catholic Church, Father Fabian Marquez, that Pope Francis reminds us that our Catholic youth now are representative of who the Catholic Church is today. They are not just our future church. With the recent headlines of kids being bullied to the point they commit suicide I am reminded that we are all facing the horrifying truth that our families and children are being targeted. This past weekend my kids and I watched PBS Nature's episode, Animal Misfits, and it featured the Artic woolly bear caterpillar moth. In the woolly bear's life cycle while in the caterpillar stage, this creature eats and waits for its chance to cocoon and become a moth. But to become a moth it must survive several winter seasons, sometimes up to fourteen winter seasons. This caterpillar literally freezes to death every winter. For several winters this animal falls into a deep freeze where his heart stops beating and his blood freezes solid. Like the story of the thawed secret agent, Austin Powers or Transformer's evil antagonist, Megatron, each summer the woolly bear caterpillar thaws and resurrects. After being frozen for months it thaws and comes back to life!

My children were so impressed that this caterpillar was like Jesus. This is one of the most amazing things allowed by God. The woolly bear demonstrates for me the grace and power that is our Lord. This is how we as a Catholic community of schools of faith go through difficult changes in order to begin anew. Regardless of the challenge, we rise and give Glory to God.





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The Art of Celebrating the Eucharist

(This is taken from a presentation I recently gave to Priests and Deacons of our Diocese. All who gather at Mass have a special, even essential role in the Liturgy. We all participate in offering the Sacrifice to God in union with the priest since we share in the royal priesthood of Christ by virtue of our Baptism. Although these reflections are primarily directed to priests and deacons understanding them should assist us all to better prepare and to participate more fully.)

Celebration of the Eucharist is the very reason for our being. Our whole life and ministry as priests is summed up and given its highest expression there.

If something important it is worth being done right and to be carried out with care. It's amazing the attention we pay to relatively unimportant things. If you want to be effective with your golf swing or if you want to be a good tackler in football you will be expected to learn and to practice specific techniques. If you want to learn how to communicate effectively in a language you will need to know the rules of its grammar. Sure, you could ignore them, but people would not understand you well.

The Liturgy is a language and a certain style of communication that comes down to us from the ages. It is a language of signs and symbols that are read universally by people in the Church. To be sure, there are regional and cultural aspects that are rightly represented as local communities worship, but these are secondary to the expressions that unite us across times and places. It is of great importance that we ourselves understand the 'language' of the symbols.

So I think it serves us well as priests and deacons to give attention to these things from time to time. Neither the Church, nor I am looking for rigid robotic uniformity. Each person will very rightly incarnate the Liturgy according to their own personality, but hopefully not in a way that seems to make

the Liturgy more about them than about God. Rather the way we celebrate should allow us to be more and more transparent instruments of God. God wants to use us and to use the gifts he gave us to make us signs of Christ present in the flesh presiding at our act of worship.

The Church, since the reform of the Liturgy initiated by the II Vatican Council, has been seeking a balance between horizontal and vertical dimensions of the Liturgy, between the way the Liturgy is intended to unite the community gathered as the Body of Christ and our encounter with the Divine. The former ways of worship tended to focus on the individual's encounter with God. Our present tendency is to focus more on our gathering with one another.


The truth I believe is that both dimensions need to be represented in a balanced way. God gathers us and forms us into a people so that as the Body of Christ we can participate in his self-offering to the Father. If we lose either dimension the work of God is something less than what God intends it to be.

Your role as a presider at Liturgy, and the role of everyone who has a leadership role through a Liturgical ministry, is to facilitate the self-discovery of the People of God. In the Liturgy they should come to know themselves as individuals and within community as an ordered Body that makes Christ present in the world. We will do that by our spirit of peace and joy, of respect and love, and by our prayerful attention to God's work in the midst of His people.


The awesome work of God in our worship will be effectively conveyed by our preparedness, which is the fruit of prayer and reflection as well as our familiarity with texts and Liturgical actions. It will be conveyed also by our focus and our willingness to be present in the moment in a way that is unrushed and smoothly flowing. Everyone who has a ministry should know their responsibilities. There should be no need for

extraneous movement or talk.

theater or even to a football game you rightly expect the actors or players to be well prepared, to know their lines and to know the plays. Is it not reasonable to expect at least that level of preparation at the times we celebrate the work of our salvation in the presence of the Almighty God?

I am very grateful for the wonderful service you, my brother priests and deacons, already provide in our Diocese. As I travel from place to place I am constantly moved by the level of commitment and energy our people bring to their gathering around the altar. This certainly says a great deal about your own dedication to this central act of your ministry. May God, through His Spirit show us how we can move forward to make our worship an even more pleasing Sacrifice of Praise.

Si desea aprender a comunicarse eficazmente en un idioma, necesitará conocer las reglas de su gramática. Claro, podrías ignorarlos, pero la gente no te entendería bien.

La Liturgia es un lenguaje y un cierto estilo de comunicación que nos fue entregada desde hace siglos. Es un lenguaje de signos y símbolos que son leídos universalmente por la gente en la Iglesia. Ciertamente, hay aspectos regionales y culturales que se representan correctamente como comunidades locales, pero son secundarios a las expresiones que nos unen a través de los tiempos y lugares. Es de gran importancia que nosotros mismos entendamos "lenguaje" de los símbolos.

Así que creo que nos sirve bien como sacerdotes

y diáconos prestar atención a estas cosas de vez en cuando. Ni la Iglesia, ni yo estamos buscando una rígida uniformidad robótica. Cada persona encarnará con razón la Liturgia según su propia personalidad, pero esperemos que no lo hagamos de una manera que parezca que la Liturgia es más cercana a ellos, que el mismo Dios. Más bien la forma en que debemos de celebrar es permitiéndonos ser instrumentos de Dios, cada vez más transparentes. Dios quiere usarnos y usar los dones que nos dio para hacernos signos de Cristo presente en la carne, predominando nuestro acto de adoración.

La Iglesia, desde la reforma de la liturgia iniciada por el Concilio Vaticano II, ha buscado un equilibrio entre las dimensiones horizontales y verticales de la Liturgia, entre la forma en que la Liturgia pretende unir a la comunidad reunida como Cuerpo de Cristo y nuestro encuentro con la Iglesia con la Divinidad. Los primeros modos de adoración tendían a centrarse en el encuentro del individuo con Dios. Nuestra tendencia actual es centrarnos más en nuestra reunión entre nosotros mismos.

La verdad creo yo, es que es ambas dimensiones necesitan ser representadas de una manera equilibrada. Dios nos reúne y nos forma en un pueblo para que, como Cuerpo de Cristo, podamos participar en su auto-ofrenda al Padre. A Special Offering to be held the weekend of June 17 and Sunday, June 18, 2017 for the Diocese of Choluteca in Honduras. The funds from this collection will help the Diocese of Choluteca with humanitarian and evangelization projects under their direction. Following Hurricane Mitch in 1998, Catholic Bishops Texas reached out to the church in Honduras and matched each diocese in Texas with a diocese in Honduras. The cities of El Paso and Brownsville were matched Choluteca, which is one of the poorest regions of Honduras and the city that was the second-hardest hit by the hurricane. The bishops were interested in developing a longterm relationship among the dioceses, not merely sending aid in aftermath of the hurricane.

Our Diocese of El Paso has had a solidarity relationship with the Diocese of Choluteca in Honduras since 1998. For several years now, we go in small groups to do mission work over there and they also send some of their missionaries to our diocese. Perhaps you know someone in your parish who has gone as missionary or your parish has received one of their missionaries. This year of 2017, our solidarity collection is trying to help the Diocese of Choluteca Minor Seminary whose roof was over 50 years old and on the brink of collapsing. It was replaced at a cost of 97,000 US dollars. We have already contributed 57,000 towards that amount and we are now trying to send the remainder 40,000. So, we appeal to your generosity. If 4000 Catholics give \$10, we can get that in less than one hour! 
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50th ORDINATION ANNIVERSARY

MONSIGNOR FRANK SMITH & FATHER STEPHEN PETERS

This year marks two very special ordination anniversaries for two of El Paso's dearest members of the clergy, Monsignor Frank Smith and Father Stephen Peters.

Monsignor Frank Smith was born in Chicago. He completed his studies at Christ the King Semianry at St. Bonaventure University. He came to El Paso in 1962 and was ordained in 1967. Monsignor Smith served several years as pastor to many faithful at parishes like All Saints Church, St. Pius and then of course St. Raphael's. He was appointed Vicar General of the Diocese of El Paso by both Bishop Raymundo Pena and Bishop Armando X. Ochoa. He was

also appointed a Protonotary

Apostolic by Pope John Paul II. In one El Paso Herald Post article Msgr. Smith stated "Being a priest is like being a doctor...but a spiritual one". Smith said, "I wanted to serve people in some capacity. Serving people has been the high point of my life, and the best way I could have done this is the priesthood".

The Bridge/ El Puente Radio recently interviewed special Guest Father Stephen Peters about his 50th Ordination Anniversary.

Fr. Peters shared the following:

1. Tell us about yourself,
where are you from what was
your childhood like? Why did
you become a priest?

"Native El Pasoan, parents Leonard and Gwendoline Peters, one older brother and one younger sister. Lived across the street from the old Bronco Theatre. Later moved to Ascarate Township used to be called that. Lived in a mobile home, Dad ran a help yourself laundry till the automatics came about and he went to work for El Paso Natural Gas till retiring. Mom worked at home, we always had a procession of Jesuits priests because my dad had been in a Jesuit seminary in Louisiana for 2 years then decided priesthood was not for him. The priests would always stop in El Paso to visit my dad, everyone thought I would be Jesuit priest. I said No I want to be a priest at the place I grew up, I want to be a Diocesan Priest."

2. When and how did you receive your call to become a priest?

"I knew I was going to be a priest with so many visiting my home. It was in me so I wanted to enter a high school seminary but we didn't have one here. I knew Santa Fe had one so I asked my cousin who went there, my Cousin Fr.John Peters who was very well known in Santa Fe. He asked me, are you thinking about that? I said, Yeah. My cousin said, "Give it a try". That's all you can do, so when I arrived, the whispers in the hallway were "He's related to Fr. John Peters. That's his cousin".

3. What advice would you give to a young person who is considering religious life?

"My Mom used to tell us after I told her that I was thinking I'd wait till I graduated from High School before I go to the seminary...she told me, "If you do not go now...you never will". She was so very correct. God calls us when we are so very young. Being involved in Vocations my whole priesthood I can only offer as advice is make it through

the discernment process and remember you don't know until you give it a try.

4. As a priest what was your most memorable moment in the priesthood?

"The Gifts that God gave me, the people I met and worked with, the Sacrament of the sick and praying for those in need of a little miracle. I have seen people walk out of ICU totally healed. Otra oportunidad The Lord would give them. Still amazes me.

5. Did you ever see your life differently for example married with kids or another type of calling?

"NO, I am an example of Catholic Education, St. Joseph's School was where it all began for me. All the way through high school in Santa Fe, I knew what my calling was at a very young age."

6. This year marks your 50th anniversary of your ordination to the priesthood,

what does this milestone mean to you?

"How blessed I am to be able to see the Lord's work. To be able to serve Him and my Diocese and my loving communities I have worked for. Jesus touches us through Sacraments and it's truly a wonderful gift.

7. What do you remember about your ordination day 50 years ago?

"1967 There were 6 of us ordained here, all my trials and tribulations, all the discernments I went through in vocations turned out to be what I was called to do, I have been in and out of Vocations my whole priesthood."

Ceremonia de Instalación de Tepeyac

El Instituto Tepeyac fue fundado en 1988 para permitir a los laicos desempeñar el rol en la misión y ministerio de la iglesia. Por los últimos 30 años más de 30,000 personas de toda la diócesis han participado en nuestros programas del Tepeyac.

El Instituto proporciona un programa de formación en dos partes: El Programa de Formación Cristiana (PFC) y el Programa de Formación de Ministerio (PFM). El PFC ofrece un marco teológico sólido para el ministerio basado en la visión del Vaticano II, escritura, el Catecismo de la Iglesia Católica, y las enseñanzas del Papa Francisco. El PFM ofrece más de la práctica necesaria para los participantes en su ministerio. Estas prácticas ministeriales se dividen en las categorías de Sacerdote, Profeta y Rey. Tepeyac también ofrece un Instituto de Verano durante el mes de junio por la facultad local y visitantes.

Los cursos se enseñan en las instalaciones del Tepeyac, aunque se han ofrecido programas en la mayoría de las parroquias de la diócesis. A través de los años, la respuesta de la gente y el apoyo de nuestros pastores ha sido abrumador. Este año, por ejemplo, el Obispo Mark J. Seitz instaló a más de 750 ministros para el servicio en nuestra diócesis.

Nuestra Certificación en Estudio Bíblico ha sido muy exitosa; se ofrece en coordinación con el Instituto Bíblico San Francisco. Este es un programa de estudio bíblico de tres años. Este año tuvimos los primeros graduados en el programa: 7 parroquianos que completaron exitosamente el programa.

Tepeyac también ofrece un Programa de Formación de Adultos, el cual es un programa de tres años con 12 cursos con algunos de los mejores teólogos de la diócesis quienes enseñan Cristología, Justicia Social, Ética Moral, Los Evangelios, Antiguo Testamento, y otros cursos. Hemos estado graduando a los participantes por los últimos nueve años, y en este año graduamos a siete de ellos.

Así como el Tepeyac continúa

creciendo, así sigue ofreciendo programas de formación de ministerio basados en las necesidades de las parroquias. Nuestro Programa de Duelo y Acompañamiento es un buen ejemplo. Este año graduamos un gran grupo para servir a nuestras parroquias.

El 28 de abril el Tepeyac celebro la Instalación de

DOPING ATHLETES

The use of performanceenhancing drugs by professional athletes not only leads to serious challenges in maintaining a level playing field in competitive sports but also raises broader ethical issues and concerns.

Some these of concerns were highlighted in 2015 when the former world number one tennis star Maria Sharapova was banned from competitive play for two years by the International Tennis Federation (ITF) after she tested positive for the banned substance meldonium. The Court of Arbitration for Sport subsequently reduced her sentence to 15 months. Meldonium, an over-thecounter Latvian drug known to dilate blood vessels and increase the flow of blood, may contribute to improving an athlete's physical endurance.

Her case was made more complicated by her claim that she was taking the drug for health reasons, a claim viewed with skepticism among other athletes and ultimately rejected by the Independent Tribunal appointed by the ITF to review the case. Former British Olympic sprinter and world championship bronze medalist Craig Pickering described the real pressure

that top athletes can face:

"I would bet my life savings that Sharapova was taking this medication because of its purported performance enhancing effects... Athletes are always going to push the boundaries in order to have a chance at success. That is what happens when you introduce competition."

In competitive athletics, the supposition is that competitors are beginning on a par with each other, which means that no one has an "unfair" or "unjust" advantage over another going into the competition. At the starting line, they arrive as equals in the sense that they arrive with whatever they were endowed with at birth, and whatever they may have managed to become through practice, hard work, and discipline.

Cheating through doping involves an attempt to step outside these rules and suppositions, and play a different game, one that circumvents or removes the "on a par" assumption without revealing the fact. In this sense, cheating through doping is wrong because it is a form of lying, a form of presenting one's initial endowment as if it were "natural," and the result of athletic discipline, even though it really may not

be so at all.

Several of Sharapova's opponents expressed frustration at what they took to be a further injustice, namely, that in April 2017, she was given a wild card re-entry into World Tennis Association (WTA) tournament play in Germany. They insisted that she should, at a minimum, have to work her way back up from whatever her ranking had declined to after more than a year of tournament inactivity. Others, such as fellow player Eugenie Bouchard, perceived the doping transgression as even more serious, and argued that Sharapova should be banned from playing for life:

"She's a cheater and so to me... I don't think a cheater in any sport should be allowed to play that sport again. It's so unfair to all the other players who do it the right way and are true. So, I think from the WTA it sends the wrong message to young kids—cheat and we'll welcome you back with open arms."

Some commentators have noted how event organizers typically like to include big name draws like Sharapova in their line ups, and former number one player Caroline Wozniacki opined that, "obviously the rules are

twisted and turned in favor of who wants to do what." Others have expressed concerns a b o u t corporate sponsors a n d

advertisers continuing to promote high profile sports personalities after they have been suspended for doping, individuals who may already be among the wealthiest athletes in the world. It seems fair to conclude that doping constitutes a form of cheating not only of one's competitors, but also one's fans, oneself, and the integrity of the sporting activity itself.

Through an honest pursuit of the athletic crown, meanwhile, we encounter the possibility of transcending who we are in limited, but important ways. The self-directed training and preparation of the athlete helps develop and hone a host of important personal qualities: strength, coordination, endurance, drive, agility, discipline, quickness, vigilance, cleverness, vision, and daring. This draws us towards an authentic perfecting of

our bodies, our character and ourselves — an inwardly-directed order and discipline that arises from deep within — and forms us in such a way that we reach beyond where we ever thought we could reach, and through that personal stretching and growth, come to experience a true measure of human fulfillment. That's something that doping athletes sadly cheat themselves from fully experiencing.

Sister Julia Romero Remembered



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Transforming the World through Education

Swartz is a School Sister of Notre Dame, a congregation of religious women founded by Blessed Theresa Gerhardinger in nineteenth century Bavaria to educate girls in small towns and villages. The Diocese of El Paso has been blessed to be the focus of Sister Elizabeth's ministry as an educator and administrator during the past twenty-one years as she accepted the call to serve as Superintendent of the Catholic Schools.

Sister Elizabeth first met the School Sisters (SSND) when they came to offer summer bible school near her home in the farmland of Maryland. She attended public school until her final two years of high school at the Academy of Our Lady in Washington, DC, which was staffed by the order. She entered the Baltimore Province of the School Sisters along with fifty other postulants after high school in 1962. As was common in those days, she was sent on her first mission as an elementary school teacher having completed only a couple of years of study. She taught first and fourth grades at a parish school in Cumberland, Maryland for the next six years. Studying summers at the College of Notre Dame of Maryland she finally achieved her Bachelor of Arts in Education in 1972.

Our Lady of Perpetual Help school in the inner city of Washington, DC was her next teaching assignment. "Those

Sister Elizabeth Anne were the days of segregation," she recalled, "and the church and school were established as a black parish." Sister taught fourth grade for four years while also being the school librarian and in charge of the after-school and summer tutoring programs. All the while she continued to study, achieving a Master of Arts in teaching in 1974.

> As the changes of Vatican II opened up new opportunities in religious congregations, Sister Elizabeth transferred to the Dallas Province of the SSND in order to be closer to her family that had moved to Arizona shortly after she entered the community. She taught in a public school in Coolidge, AZ where her classroom included Native Mexican American students. She became even more aware of the impact of prejudice, poverty and public policy on the educational system.

> Sister Elizabeth was asked to return to Dallas to teach sixth and seventh grade math and religion for two years at a school her congregation staffed. Meanwhile, was encouraged to get her certification in administration at Texas Women's University so that she was ready to accept a position as principal at Holy Rosary School in San Antonio in 1980. Under her leadership the school that was on the verge of collapse, physically and financially, was restored and became the first school in the archdiocese to have a

computer lab. And it was time to move on!

The demand for Sisters in Catholic school administration increased as the number of women religious serving classroom teachers decreased. Sister Elizabeth Anne accepted challenging positions as principal and eventually leadership at the diocesan level. "I've always been mentored by our Sisters and was encouraged to prepare for administration," she recalled. In 1996 Bishop Ochoa hired Sister Elizabeth as Superintendent of Catholic Schools for the Diocese of El Paso. In her second year she also accepted the responsibility for the schools in the San Angelo diocese.

During her twenty-one years of service at the diocesan level, Sister has seen schools open and close. She appreciates the ways that the particular charisms and values of the founding congregations imbue the institutions they have sponsored: Franciscan Brothers, Sisters of Loretto, Brothers of the Christian Schools, Sisters of the Incarnate Word and Fr. Yermo. In the schools of the Diocese of El Paso there are currently just nine religious sisters and

three religious brothers in teaching or administrative positions. Sister Elizabeth Anne strongly believes in the importance of nurturing and mentoring lay teachers to carry on the tradition of Catholic education.

She has worked to build up the scholarship fund so that tuition assistance is available for those who desire a Catholic education but cannot afford it. As well, she has worked to establish a fund to make teachers' salaries more equitable in schools across the diocese.

Now this School Sister of Notre Dame, fifty-three years professed, is going to take a year of sabbatical. She looks forward to having time to read, to pray, to visit her family and to play some golf. She'll be listening for the next directions of the Spirit, but she's hoping to stay in the area. A teacher at heart, perhaps she will be substituting in a classroom now and then. "The challenge is to educate and form our Catholics- period!" said Sister Elizabeth in her usual matter-of-fact tone. That challenge expresses the description of the mission of the School Sisters of Notre Dame: Transforming the world through education! It is a mission that Sister Elizabeth Anne has truly embraced.

escuela biblica del verano cerca de su hogar en las zonas rurales de Maryland. Ella asistió a la escuela pública hasta sus dos años finales de la preparatoria en la Academia de Nuestra Señora en Washington, DC, que fue provista por la orden. Entró en la Provincia de Baltimore de las Hermanas Escolar junto con otras cincuenta postulantes después de la preparatoria en 1962. Como era común en aquellos días, fue enviada en su primera misión como maestra de escuela primaria habiendo completado sólo algunos años de estudio. Ella enseñó primero y cuarto año en una escuela parroquial en Cumberland, Maryland para los siguentes seis años. Estudiando veranos en el Colegio de Notre Dame de Maryland, finalmente logró su Bachillerato en Artes en Educación en 1972.

La escuela Nuestra Señora del Socorro Perpetuo en el centro de la ciudad de Washington, DC fue su siguiente posición como maestro. "Esos fueron los días de la segregación", recordó, "y la iglesia y la escuela se establecieron como una parroquia de la raza negra." La hermana enseñó cuarto año durante cuatro años, mientras que también encargada de la biblioteca de la escuela y a cargo de la tutoría después de la escuela y los programas del verano. Todo el tiempo ella continuó estudiando, alcanzando un Maestría de Artes de Enseñanza en 1974.

A medida que los cambios del Vaticano II abrieron nuevas oportunidades en las congregaciones religiosas, la Hermana Elizabeth se trasladó a la provincia de Dallas de la SSND para estar más cerca de su familia que se había trasladado a Arizona poco después de entrar en la comunidad. Ella enseñó en una escuela pública en Coolidge, AZ donde su salón de estudiantes incluyó Americanos-nativos y mexicanos. Se hizo aún más consciente del impacto de los prejuicios, la pobreza y las políticas públicas en el sistema educativo.

Se le pidió a la hermana Elizabeth que regresara a Dallas para enseñar matemáticas y religión del sexto y séptimo año durante dos años en una escuela donde su congregación estaba a cargo de la administración. Mientras tanto, se le animó a obtener su certificación en administración en la Universidad Texas Women's para estar preparada para aceptar una posición como directora en la Escuela Santo Rosario en San Antonio en 1980. Bajo su liderazgo la escuela que estaba al borde del colapso, físicamente y financieramente, fue restaurado y se convirtió en la primera escuela en la archidiócesis a tener un laboratorio de computación. ¡Y era hora de seguir adelante!

La demanda de Hermanas en la administración de las escuelas católicas aumentó al mismo tiempo que disminuía el número de mujeres religiosas que servían como maestras. La Hermana Elizabeth Anne aceptó posiciones desafiantes como directora y eventualmente liderazgo a nivel diocesano. "Siempre he sido orientada por nuestras hermanas y me animaron a prepararme para la administración", recordó. En 1996 el Obispo Ochoa contrató a la Hermana Elizabeth como Superintendente de Escuelas Católicas para la Diócesis de El Paso. En su segundo año también aceptó la responsabilidad de las escuelas de la diócesis de San Angelo.

Durante sus veintiún años de servicio a nivel diocesano, la Hermana ha visto abrir y cerrar varias escuelas. Aprecia la manera en que los carismas y valores particulares de las congregaciones fundadoras impregnan las instituciones que han patrocinado: Hermanos Franciscanos, Hermanas de Loretto, Hermanos de las Escuelas Cristianas, Hermanas del Verbo Incarnado y el Padre Yermo. En las escuelas de la Diócesis de El Paso actualmente sólo hay nueve hermanas religiosas y tres hermanos religiosos en puestos docentes o administrativos. La hermana Elizabeth Anne cree firmemente en la importancia de educar y formar a los maestros laicos para que sigan la tradición de la educación católica.

Ella ha trabajado para construir el fondo de becas para que la asistencia de matrícula esté disponible para aquellos que desean una educación católica, pero no pueden pagarla. Además, ha trabajado para establecer un fondo para hacer los salarios de los maestros más equitativos en las escuelas a través de la diócesis.

Ahora esta Hermana Escolar de Notre Dame, profesada de cincuenta y tres años, va a tomar un año sabático. Espera tener tiempo para leer, rezar, visitar a su familia y jugar al golf. Ella estará escuchando las siguientes direcciones del Espíritu, pero ella espera permanecer en el area de El Paso. Una profesora de corazón, tal vez se va a sustituir en un salón de vez en cuando. "¡El reto es educar y formar nuestros católicos- punto!", dijo la hermana Elizabeth con su tono habitual de realidad. Ese reto expresa la descripción de la misión de las Hermanas Escolares de Notre Dame: ¡Transformar el mundo a través de la educación! Es una misión que la Hermana Elizabeth Anne ha abrazado verdaderamente.

A COLLEGE GRADUATION AND THE PROCESS OF BECOMING A PRIEST

I once asked the children at a Catholic school mass for vocations if they thought I was born a priest, or if they imagined that I fell from the sky and arrived to this earth as a priest. There were a few who raised their hands in affirmation. While many of the others who were there laughed and apparently knew this was not true, we often do not stop to think about this reality. Subconsciously, we forget that God's work is a gradual process. It is not instant or expedited. It takes constant labor, dedication, and love.

On the 13th of May, I visited our seminarians at Conception Seminary College in Conception, Missouri for their graduation. Cesar, Peter, and Sergio are the three El Paso seminarians who studied there for the past years. Each of these seminarians arrived with the desire to be a priest and were somewhat scared by the process when they realized that it would take from eight to nine years on average. Sergio,

from Chihuahua, had the task of learning English before he could engage in the necessary studies. Peter and Cesar are from El Paso and were raised speaking English and Spanish, yet they had challenges of their own that they needed to overcome. Our three students arrived at Saint Charles Seminary in El Paso when they first began their seminary process with Fr. Miguel Angel Sanchez. At Saint Charles, they began to enter the discipline of seminary life and to take some preliminary courses for their future studies in philosophy, until the diocese made the commitment of sending them to study philosophy at They desire to Conception. become priests for El Paso.

The United States Catholic Bishops, in their program for Priestly Formation, require that seminarians obtain a Bachelor's Degree in Philosophy, or the equivalent, before engaging in five years of theological studies at the Master's level. Cesar, Peter, and Sergio celebrated that they completed this requirement and are now ready continue their journey. The process has been one in which they have studied with dedication, but also one in which they have been attentive to God's calling. continue They to perceive that this calling is to love Him and

give themselves to Him and His people as priests of El Paso in the future. We pray that as the Church of El Paso we can help them to persevere in this desire to respond to God's initiative faithfully.

In the meantime, the Lord continues to call others to engage on this journey. We celebrate that seven of our seminarians completed their first year of introductory formation at Saint Charles Seminary. Like Cesar, Peter and Sergio, they will face several more years of studies in Philosophy and then

ENSEÑOREADO EL "SINSENTIDO"

Vivimos tiempos agitación, el nerviosismo y el estrés. Tiempos en el que el padre de la mentira a inficionado las inteligencias de los hombres y mujeres, haciéndoles llamar al bien mal y al mal bien, dando luz por oscuridad y oscuridad por luz, sembrando en sus conciencia la duda y el escepticismo que agotan en ellas todo brote de esperanza en un horizonte de plenitud que el mundo con sus alagos no sabe ni puede dar.

Creen en Dios y Creen también en mi" (Jn. 14,1). Nosotros los cristianos sabemos el Camino que nos lleva a Jesús. Ya sabemos dónde encontrarlo, que hacer para empezar esta Vida Nueva, pero debemos decidirnos. Dejemos de sustitutos del Verdadero Mesías, dejemos de auto engañarnos y engañar a otros, transmitiendo irresponsablemente nuestras dudas, incertidumbre y apatía espiritual. No perdamos el tiempo y nuestra vida en vanas divagaciones.

Un hombre sin ideas claras, es un hombre desorientado, es un hombre sin ruta o al menos es un hombre que sigue una ruta que no termina en una meta, sino que sigue caminos y caminos que se chocan y se entrecruzan pero no conducen a un fin, parece que viviera en un laberinto. La idea es la madre de la acción; a ideas claras seguirán acciones definidas

y con orientación hacia su objetivo bien conocido y amorosamente buscado. Dios es la Verdad; cuanto más nos alejamos de Dios, mas nos alejamos de la luz y más nos circundas las tinieblas del error; y por más esfuerzos que hagamos más nos enfrascamos en la oscuridad del error y en la maldad. Y cuando el hombre camina en el error y la maldad, por más que el crea que se halla en la verdad y en el bien, no deja de dirigirse hacia la catástrofe, menos esperada por él. A TALE OF TWO SEMINARIES

During a recent visit to Mundelein Seminary, outside of Chicago, the Associate Academic Dean, Christopher McAtee, a former Mundelein seminarian, sat across from me and the El Paso seminarians and said, "What can these guys do to help you fundraise for seminarian education?" I was taken aback and pleasantly surprised, and our young men listened intently to the answer. "They can make themselves available and connect with people from our diocese during events for seminarians, at gatherings, during internships, visits to churches, and our Pastoral Center, they can sit with guests of the annual Foundation of Faith Dinner so people get to know them; they can prepare for priestly service by simply sharing their experiences and becoming part of our lives."

It's a two-way street. In order for me to fundraise for the Diocese and to better raise awareness for main areas of focus and initiatives, like seminarian education, I believe I need to be with the very people I'm serving and helping, rooted in their lives. And that's how I ended up in my Tale of Two Seminaries.

In January of this

year, I had the good fortune of joining guests from dioceses across Texas to celebrate the Scanlan Foundation's 70th anniversary. I took that opportunity to schedule a visit with our El Paso seminarians Coronado Alfonso Christus Alapini, 1st and 2nd year Theology students, at St. Mary's Seminary. I secretly prayed that Cardinal DiNardo would be at the big event, that he would remember me from his visit to El Paso, and joked (sort of) about him inviting me to dinner. Instead I met a great group of local priests huddled together in the back of the room laughing and having a great time, just like brothers do. We took some pictures and I scored a gracious lunch invitation from my new friend, Fr. John Rooney, the Director of Spiritual Formation at St. Mary's Seminary. Alfonso greeted me warmly when I arrived at the seminary on a crisp winter afternoon. He's known for being sociable, kind, and good to everyone. During lunch, we talked about human formation, spiritual formation, the life of a seminarian, the culture of the seminary and the changing Church. I couldn't let the education stop there and when I asked Fr. Rooney if I could sit in on a scripture class with Christus, he said, "absolutely".

The class was on the Gospel of John and the professor at the University of St. Thomas School of Theology (on the seminary campus), Dr. Laura Manzo, an ex-cop, was dead serious, articulate, and engaging. The men were all bright and relaxed, had detailed discussions about each word, the historical context of the scripture, the meaning, and where the people in the story came from physically and philosophically, and while I desperately tried to flip through my United States of Catholic Conference Bishops readings and cheat sheets on my phone, they jumped way ahead. It was impressive and my eyes were opened. Alfonso gave me a tour, talked about his classes and their lives there, and talked openly about the challenges of the rigorous academic program, especially for a native Spanish speaker. He showed me the mail room and told me how great it is to receive news from home (so drop our seminarians a line, they will really appreciate it). Christus spoke about his speech and English classes, the fact that he speaks several languages, and how he and Alfonso were discouraged from speaking Spanish socially because they need to practice their English. They are both gifted and will

make great priests one day. At the end of a very long day and a beautiful Mass celebrated in English and Vietnamese by a newly ordained priest and graduate of St. Mary's, all of the men from the seminary, along with their rector and visitors from the community, gathered to celebrate the Chinese New Year. It was time for everyone to come together, to eat delicious food prepared with love, to drink a little sake and to just let loose for a brief moment. The life of a seminarian is a disciplined, structured existence. The life of a Catholic seminarian includes daily Mass, adoration of the Blessed Sacrament, regular conferences, days of recollection, apostolic work, classes, prayer, meditation, and devotions, as well as a lot of study time—it takes 9 years to become a priest.

This May, I hopped in a little blue rental car and drove from Chicago to Mundelein, Illinois, where I was greeted by

Iván Montelongo, a 2nd year Theology student, Germán Alzate, a 3rd year Theology student who will be ordained to the priesthood in 2018, and Angel Tarango, a Pre-Theology student. 2nd year Theology student Michael Lewis was in El Paso on an internship. At the entrance of Mundelein Seminary is a sign that says, "University of St. Mary of the Lake". As you drive in along a beautiful path surrounded by trees and cross several bridges, you encounter a serene

lake and an incredible villa built for Cardinal Mundelein. As part of the work study program, Iván cleans the villa where Cardinal Cupich now stays. The institution became known throughout the world in 1926 as a site for the International Eucharistic Congress. Iván and Michael are trying to determine, through studies made possible through the Canary Grant they were awarded in 2016, if San Pedro de Jesús Maldonado visited Mundelein during the

Congress. We headed out to dinner and I could see that the seminarians had something they wanted to ask me. Eventually one of them said, "Why are you here? Do you have a conference, a meeting?" I said, "I'm here to see you!" As was the case at St. Mary's, the seminarians were full of gratitude for the visit and incredibly generous with their time. Iván was done with finals and able to give me a complete tour. He did so with great pride and provided a tremendous amount of detail. I was impressed with how much the seminarians knew this

founded seminary, why he chose the architecture—Cardinal Mundelein thought that a beautiful soul is shaped in beautiful surroundingsand how it is laid out symmetrically. They talked about the Column of the Immaculate Conception and the great story behind it (About the 19th Century column in Rome, Cardinal Mundelein told the powers that be, "I want it for my seminary." Rome said no. So he built the identical statue, only one foot taller), and what was the significance of the

seven steps leading up to the high altar in the Chapel of the Immaculate Conception. They showed me their dorms, living,

and recreation areas to get a real sense of seminary life, introduced me to every staff and faculty member, and friend we encountered, talked about medieval philosophy finals the details of the paper on Isaiah, invited me to Mass, included me in every meal (it was great to hear someone exclaim at breakfast, "It's Thursday, we get bacon!), and like my own children, they began to sigh heavily when I asked for just one more picture. I could not leave Mundelein without meeting Seminary Rector Fr. John Kartje (Germán tried hard to teach me how to pronounce his name but to no avail). Fr. John has a B.A. in Mathematics, a B.S. in Physics, and a Ph.D. in Astrophysics from the University of Chicago; M.Div (Master of Divinity), S.T.B. in Sacred (Baccalaureate Theology Degree) from the University of St. Mary of the Lake/Mundelein Seminary; and S.T.L. (Licentiate in Sacred Theology), S.T.D. ((Doctor of Sacred Theology) from the Catholic University of America. Last month he presented a lecture on Faith like why Cardinal Mundelein and Science at the Adler particular Planetarium. He told me I could

call him any time to learn more about the seminary and said he looks forward to coming to El Paso, hopefully next year for the priestly ordination of Germán Alzate.

When you have the opportunity, visit seminaries where the men who will be incardinated for the Diocese of El Paso study. We have seminarians in our introductory phase at Saint Charles Seminary in El Paso and seminarians at different levels of formation in the areas of philosophy and theology at Assumption Oblate Seminary (San Antonio), Mundelein Seminary (Illinois), Mary's Seminary (Houston), and Sacred Heart Seminary (Milwaukee). Most of all, pray for our men in formation and for more vocations.

May the Holy Spirit fill newly ordained Fr. Cong Vo, a graduate of Assumption Seminary, with grace as he starts his priestly service to the people of God as the Parochial Vicar at St. Raphael Parish on June 15.

There are 22 men in priestly formation, a 100% increase from 2008, and we expect up to 14 more men in the fall. The average cost to educate a priest is \$35,000 annually and it takes 9 years to become a priest.

We are grateful for our priests who benefit our lives with the pastoral and professional work they providebaptisms, weddings, last rites, confession, celebrating Mass, spiritual direction, counseling and so much more. Our need for well-trained, highly educated priests is great, and the responsibility of providing priests for the Diocese of El Paso, both spirituality and financially, belongs to all of us. "The harvest is abundant but the laborers are few." -Matthew 9:37
