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The El Paso Museum of History's Wall of Giants series this time truly highlights a giant in this region's rich history and is a tribute to the formation of our diocese. The El Paso Museum of History's eighth Wall of Giants exhibit titled First Steps, commemorates the 100th Year Anniversary or Centennial Celebration of St. Patrick Cathedral as well as the 92nd Anniversary of Cathedral High School. The exhibit demonstrates the very rich history of both of these landmark institutions.

"Saint **Patrick** Cathedral and Cathedral High School have a continuos mission of serving the El Paso community and building ties that bring both sides of our border closer," says El Paso Museum History Director, David Grabitske. are excited to share this piece of El Paso's history as part of the Circle of Giants."

Dr. David Carrejo, Associate Dean the UTEP College of Education and a proud Cathedral Graduate from Class of 1988 says, "Both of their histories are so interwoven. What we are hoping for is people will leave here with a deeper appreciation of the history of the Diocese of El Paso as it was established and to see how that history is also tied into a lot of El Paso history". Dr. Carrejo mentions that some amazing connections about the histories of these two institutions is the ties they have to Mexico and the Cristeros Revolt.

Rene Valenzuela, Member of the Circle of Giants Committee and Cathedral alumni from Class of 1964 says, "There are so many aspects and details to the exhibit that I really encourage everyone to come see it, not just Catholics. It is interesting to see how both institutions contributed to our region's history." He mentions a plaque at Cathedral High School that displays the names and photographs of 14 Cathedral graduates who served in World War II. The plaque is included in the exhibit with in depth highlights of these soldiers and their contribution to World War II. He mentions Lionel Smith, a Cathedral Class of 1929 graduate, who became a WWII bomber pilot, volunteered for the Canadian Air Force, the Royal Air Force and the India Air Force who lost his life in service.

mine was in preservation mode and sadly very unused and seldom enjoyed.



I have been saving them for some future great event that has to be perfect. I have been saving crystal, fine silverware, for what? To use twice a year? I am going to die one day and maybe then will be the perfect time to use the Tiffany & Co. and Waterford at my funeral reception.

Recently I traveled to

Sedona Arizona, a red rock city and known to many new agers

for its intense vortex energy. It was a trip that took over twenty years to plan with four friends that through the years have stayed in touch but have not been together in what seemed to be forever. After marriage (for one of us it was plural), many kids (17 kids between the four of us), demanding careers



and heartbreaking losses (three of us lost a parent to cancer and one of us lost a sister to a tragic accident) we just could not decide on when would be the perfect time to come together. Time flew by fast, really fast and before we knew it life was past the halfway mark of the

average human lifespan. We hit that midpoint and went into preservation mode just like the items in my china cabinet only coming out of the routine under extenuating circumstances.

Finally earlier this summer we realized that the perfect time was not coming and we no longer had the time to wait. We busted out of our china cabinets and flew to Phoenix from all over and drove to Sedona. It was like we had never been apart and we picked up right where we left off. This trip quickly became about reconnecting and getting back to basics in our health, our careers and our families. Remembering that success and fortune are not the keys to happiness and that life's greatest treasures were the smaller things in life. Realizing that less really is more.

We did the vortex hikes to the major sites, each an awesome natural wonder. These sites are known for causing people to feel something inside them like an abundance of joy or happiness. Interestingly though only one of the known vortexes made me feel something and I do not think it was because of

the direction the energy flows. It happened to be the only Catholic Church on the list of sites, Chapel of The Holy Cross.

This magnificent church is built into the side of a mountain and as you enter it all you feel is light. It is small with about only ten pews on each side but the altar sits on a window that overlooks the most amazing view I have ever had the privilege of witnessing. Breathtaking, tear jerking, aweinspiring is how I can describe it and even those words do not do the experience of this church justice. Each tapestry was an abstract painting representing the Mercy of God in Life, in Heaven, on Earth and lastly in Creation. I sat right next to the Mercy of God in Life. I sat there reflecting its meaning. I sat there in one of the most beautiful places I have ever seen, next to this beautiful tapestry made of silk pondering the Mercy of God and guess what I, a most fallible believer, noticed and focused on? I noticed a small safety pin in the corner of the tapestry holding it onto the rod on which it was woven around. I noticed this tiny imperfection in a place of perfection. Only me, and the perfectionist in me, would notice this small imperfection at this time and in this place. Mercy of God in Life tapestry was being held together by a safety pin. I could not believe my own laughably perfectionist thoughts. And then it hit me, the perfect was gifted to the imperfect.

God showed us the greatest act of Mercy in Life by sending His perfect son to die for the imperfect us. God expects us, his children, to also be merciful. Mercy is so important that He asks us to bind it around our necks and write upon the tablet of our hearts. In His mercy, He knows and loves the imperfect because He knows and loves us. I can no longer expect the perfect time, day, occasion, reason, person or life because I too must love the imperfect. Today the only things in my china cabinet are the wine glasses and who knows...I may start serving Kool-Aid in those soon.



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Overcoming the Scourge of Sexual Abuse

Evervone saddened recently to hear the news that one of the priests, Miguel Luna, who served this Diocese has acknowledged that he abused a young adolescent girl in the 1980's. One of my most heart-wrenching tasks as a bishop has been to speak to victims of such abuse, to hear their story and feel the terrible pain they have endured, often for many years.

It has taken the Church and society as a whole a long time to face this issue in place for some time but and to recognize the depth of under my direction we hired the harm that is caused when a full time Safe Environment a person who is supposed to Coordinator, Diana Bulko, represent God uses a child or any other person for their own perverted and lustful purposes. Many victims of abuse will struggle to recover throughout their lives. Victims of abuse by a priest often also understandably struggle with their relationship with God and the Church.

I continue to be deeply sorry for the pain that members of the Church have caused. For many years I have regularly fasted and prayed for all the victims of abuse. As a Diocese we have been working with these victims when they come to us through the offices of our Victim's Assistance Coordinator, Susan Martinez, LCSW. She is always willing to listen to victims who seek us out and to give whatever assistance we as a Diocese can offer for their healing.

One of the proactive responses we have taken to this scourge of abuse is the institution of a new program for the training of clergy, staff and volunteers in parishes and catholic schools.

We had a program MPS. She was given the charge to find the most effective program of safe environment formation that is currently available. We decided on the program known as VIRTUS.


For two years now we have been using this program and in this brief time we have trained over 15,000 people, including clergy, diocesan and parish staff and parish/ school volunteers throughout the Diocese. Every parish and catholic school in the Diocese has a school/parish-based safe environment coordinator and under their direction national back ground checks have been conducted and over 500 classes are offered in parishes and catholic schools every year. Recientemente, el mundo se entristeció al escuchar la noticia de que uno de los sacerdotes, Miguel Luna, quien sirvió a esta Diócesis, reconoció haber abusado de una joven adolescente en los años ochenta. Una de mis tareas más desgarradoras como obispo, ha sido hablar con las víctimas de tal abuso, escuchar su historia y sentir el terrible dolor que haber soportado debieron durante constantemente, durante muchos años.

Ha tomado a la Iglesia y a la sociedad en conjunto, un largo tiempo para enfrentar este problema y reconocer la profundidad del daño que se produce cuando una persona que se supone que representa a Dios, utiliza a un niño o a cualquier otra persona para su propio pervertido y lujuriosos propósitos. Muchas víctimas del abuso lucharán para recuperarse a través de sus vidas. Las víctimas de abuso cometido por un sacerdote, a menudo también y comprensiblemente, luchan con su relación con Dios y con la Iglesia

Continuo sintiendo profundamente el dolor que estos miembros de la Iglesia han causado. Durante muchos años, he ayunado y rezado con regularidad por todas las víctimas del abuso. Como diócesis, hemos estado trabajando con estas víctimas cuando se acercan a través de las oficinas de la Coordinadora de Asistencia a Víctimas, Susan Martínez, LCSW. Ella siempre está dispuesta a escuchar a las víctimas que nos buscan y a darles cualquier ayuda que nosotros como Diócesis podemos ofrecer para su sanación.

También hemos puesto en marcha un proceso mediante el cual podemos investigar las denuncias de abuso. Por supuesto, siempre recomendamos que una víctima se acerque a la policía, si es que no lo han hecho. Tenemos un sobresaliente Comité de Respuesta Pastoral, el cual está formado por asesores profesionales y por otras personas independientes de la Diócesis y quienes son expertos en la realización de investigaciones sobre estas acusaciones. Ellos presentan sus hallazgos a nuestra Junta de Revisión, la cual saca conclusiones y recomienda acciones concernientes a las consecuencias para el agresor y asistencia para la víctima.

Así como ustedes ya deben de saber, este problema del abuso sexual no es sólo un problema dentro de la Iglesia, sino que se encuentra en todas las instituciones de la sociedad, incluyendo escuelas, organizaciones juveniles dentro de las mismas familias. Una de las respuestas proactivas que hemos tomado a este flagelo del abuso, es la institución de un nuevo programa para la formación de clérigos, personal y voluntarios en parroquias y escuelas católicas.

Tuvimos ya un programa ya instituido durante algún tiempo, pero bajo mi dirección contratamos a una Coordinadora de Medio Ambiente Seguro, por tiempo completo, Diana Bulko, MPS. Se le dio a ella la tarea de buscar el programa más eficaz sobre la formación de ambiente seguro, la cual está actualmente disponible. Decidimos conseguir el programa conocido como VIRTUS.

Hace ya dos años que hemos estado usando este programa y en este breve tiempo hemos capacitado a más de 15,000 personas, incluyendo al clero, personal diocesano parroquial, voluntarios parroquiales y escolares, en toda la Diócesis. Cada escuela parroquial y católica de la Diócesis tiene un coordinador de ambiente seguro ahí mismo en la escuela y/o parroquia y bajo su dirección se han llevado a cabo chequeos de fondo nacionales y se ofrecen más de 500 clases en parroquias y escuelas católicas cada año. Las personas son entrenadas en cuanto a cómo reconocer signos de conducta inapropiada y estar al tanto de los indicadores presentes cuando un niño está experimentando abuso.

Les invito a que oren y a que trabajen conmigo para que podamos erradicar este terrible mal de entre nosotros, de la Iglesia, de nuestras instituciones, de nuestras familias, de toda la sociedad. Todo el mundo tiene un papel en esta lucha. En la lucha contra el abuso, la ignorancia es uno de nuestros mayores enemigos. Usted puede ayudar a hacer de nuestras comunidades, lugares donde todos los niños y adultos que son vulnerables puedan estar verdaderamente seguros y amados, respetados y servidos como Jesús nos ha enseñado.

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

Continued from Pg. 1 Another Cathedral 1944 graduate, James Carr Foster, was on the SS Léopoldville troop ship that was torpedoed by a Nazi submarine on Christmas Eve in 1944 and killed 700 soldiers.

Jorge Ignacio Angulo, Member of the Circle of Giants Committee Cathedral Class of 1959. mentions how relevant the laity's contribution was to educating many generations at Cathedral High School and St. Patrick schools. He also highlights how both of these schools contributed to the moral upbringing of El Pasoans in general. Angulo mentions, "As organizers of the exhibit we too have learned many things about their histories that we didn't even know."

In the exhibit you can find the appeal letter written in 1924 by Father Malachy O' Leary, Rector of St. Patrick Cathedral, which at that time was written demonstrate financial need and other challenges the Church was experiencing in this region of the country. Challenges faced included immigration, Ku Klux Klan and unrestricted nightlife and gambling in Juarez. Father Malachy was able to build the first Catholic Community Center because of the appeal in this letter.

The poignant history in education of the Sisters of Loretto and Brothers of Christian Schools in El Paso is also a prodigious part of the

exhibit. A highlight of Father Richard Matty's work at St. Patrick Cathedral and a tribute to his relentless faith and touching sermons is also featured.

Another very important aspect to the history on display here includes Bishop

El Paso del Norte, now Ciudad Juarez, in 1668 up until Pope Francis' visit in 2016. First Steps Exhibit will gain additional artifacts and history to showcase as time progresses. This is one you cannot miss!

FIRST WEDNESDAYS: DISCERNMENT EVENINGS FOR WOMEN

"Jesus Calls Women" was the title of a video promoting vocations to religious life some years ago. It sounds obvious. Of course women are still being called to the consecrated life, as well as the married and dedicated single state of life! But how resources are available here in the diocese to help them? Where do they even begin a journey of discernment?

The Vocation Committee for Religious of the diocese meets every month to create opportunities for women to consider their calling. The First Wednesday Women are a low-key, nopressure way to gather with Sisters from several congregations. We gather at 6 pm at the Diocesan Vocation Office, located behind the Pastoral Center near St. Charles Seminary, 8330 Park Haven Ave. We share a light supper and afterwards there is conversation around a theme of vocation discernment and prayer. We finish around 7:30 pm.

the Since first gathering in January eight women have participated and several come regularly. They range in age from 18 to truth! These evenings are not 45 years and they represent recruitment fairs for women

moment in every the discernment process, from "I'm barely able to say out loud that I am discerning..." to "I am pretty sure God is calling me and I am willing but don't know how to find a congregation". They find it is a relief to be able to talk do they hear the call and what freely about their doubts, to ask their questions and to share the obstacles they encounter as they consider a call to religious life. The Sisters themselves have had the same doubts, asked those questions and encountered similar obstacles as they discerned their life's path. Some issues are the same Discernment Evenings for now as ever, for example, the resistance or opposition of family members to a religious vocation. In recent years the accumulation of educational debt has become an obstacle for discerners. These are just some of the things we talk about over supper or during the evening presentations.

One of the greatest obstacles to overcome is the fear that by even coming to a discernment evening or other vocation event a woman needs to be ready to sign on the dotted line and make a life commitment. Nothing could be further from the

religious. The Sisters know better than anyone that the process of discerning a call to religious life takes place over years and includes times of clarity and doubt, coming close and backing away. Even more, they see their role as resources and co-listeners to the Holy Spirit at work in each discerner. The goal is to help each woman find the path that leads her to the life God created her to live. If that is a consecrated religious life then our role is to help her find the congregation and charism that is a good fit for her. And if the calling is to married or a dedicated single life then we celebrate and affirm that vocation!

Another opportunity

for women to discern their life direction is a retreat weekend planned for Nov. 3-5 called "Ven y Veras~ Come and See". The model is similar to the "Jornada Vocacional" used in the Diocese of Juarez. The first retreat will focus on the themes: Who am I? Who calls us to life? How do I live in the fullness of life? Two additional retreats will be offered in February and May with related themes for discernment. The retreats will be held at the Dominican Retreat Center in the Lower Valley and will begin on Friday at 6 pm and conclude Sunday at 4 pm. They will be bilingual and are open to Catholic single women age 18-40 yrs. For further





Estas son sólo algunas de las cosas que hablamos durante la cena o durante las presentaciones de la noche.

Uno de los mayores obstáculos a superar es el temor de que al llegar a una velada de discernimiento o otro evento vocacional, una mujer tenga que estar lista para firmar en la línea punteada y hacer un compromiso final. ¡Nada mas lejos de la verdad! Estos eventos no son ferias de reclutamiento para mujeres religiosas. Las Hermanas saben mejor que nadie que el proceso de discernir un llamado a la vida religiosa tiene lugar a lo largo de los años e incluye tiempos de claridad y duda, acercándose y alejándose. Aún más, ven su papel como recursos y coescuchas del Espíritu Santo en el trabajo en cada persona. El objetivo es ayudar a cada mujer a encontrar el camino que la lleva a la vida que Dios la creó para vivir. 

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Bishop Seitz Intercedes With ICE to Keep Mom and Daughter Battling Cancer Together

On August 07, Bishop Mark Seitz of the Diocese of El Paso visited with

authorities U.S. Immigration and Customs Enforcement (ICE) in an attempt to halt the deportation of a mom whose daughter is battling the effects of cancer. Less than 24 hours later, ICE granted a six-month stay of deportation to Maria Elena de Loera, granting her more time to stay with her 8-year-old daughter, Alia. Alia is currently undergoing treatment for a rare type of cancer that has affected her lungs after also having attacked her bones.

Two years ago, with her children at her side, Maria arrived legally to the border fleeing violence in Ciudad Juarez. Organized crime elements there had extorted and threatened the life of her husband and eventually murdered him. As happens to the majority of Mexican asylum seekers seeking refuge in El Paso, Maria's asylum claim was denied, but she was given permission to remain in the country to attend to the urgent medical needs of Alia.

Despite her daughter's ongoing critical condition, ICE recently informed

Maria that her permission to remain in the United States for humanitarian reasons was to be terminated and that she was to be deported. Deportation for Maria would have meant either separation from her daughter and other children or removing Alia from treatment at El Paso Children's Hospital. Similar treatment is unavailable in Mexico and since her husband's murder, Maria is the sole provider for her children.

After learning about Maria and her family's predicament, Bishop Seitz and members of the newly formed Diocesan Commission Migration contacted ICE authorities, asking them to reverse their decision. The Hope Border Institute, a Catholic advocacy organization based in El Paso, worked with Maria's attorney, Linda Rivas of Las Americas Immigrant Advocacy Center, to bring Maria's case to the attention of federal lawmakers and national immigration advocates.

On the morning that Maria was instructed to report to her deportation officer, Bishop Seitz visited Maria and Alia at the hospital. The bishop spent time with the family and prayed for Alia's recovery. Then, accompanied by Ms. Rivas and priests of the Diocesan Migration Commission, Bishop Seitz went to ICE offices to plead on Maria's behalf. The next morning, Maria was informed of the happy news that she would be able to stay with

her daughter for another six months as she continues treatment.

Bishop Seitz' actions came just weeks after the publication of his pastoral letter, Sorrow and Mourning Flee Away, in which he called attention to the human and moral consequences of a broken immigration

system and increased border militarization. After learning the outcome of his intervention to keep Maria's family together, the bishop said, "Maria and Alia are the human face of a broken immigration system. Putting a vulnerable family in jeopardy is the wrong thing to do. As people of faith

and as Americans, working for a more just immigration systems means ensuring that compassion wins out over cruelty."



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Fall 2017 at Tepeyac Institute

In preparation for what is going to be Tepeyac's 30th Anniversary, we are working on some changes to the programs in order to facilitate the process for those parishioners who want to be installed by Bishop Seitz as ministers.

For any Catholic who wants to serve in our Diocese, the beginning of the process is the Christian Formation Program (CFP) which started on August 21st at the Martyrs of the Americas Hall, Queen of Peace and Holy Spirit parishes. There will be another six-weeks period starting on October 4th and it will be at the Martyrs of the Americas Hall, Queen of Peace and St.

Matthew parishes. The program consists of 12 sessions of 2-hours each. These sessions provide the participants with a basic knowledge of theology to better understand their call to ministry. The classes are every week for a six-week period in two different modalities: two weeknights for two hours or Saturdays' mornings for 4 hours.

The second part of the training is the Ministry Formation Program (MFP) that provides the theology behind every ministry. MFP provides practicum and details so that participants can conduct their ministry with a new, more enlightened perspective. This year we had 31 ministries'

training that prepared more than 600 installed ministers. These ministers were prepared to follow the mission of Jesus to be kings, prophets and priests.

This year, we are going to offer ministry training for lectors and extraordinary communion ministers after the first six-week period. Those attending this period can take the ministry training and be installed by Bishop Seitz on November 17th, 2017! For more information on other ministries, the MFP brochure will be available by the end of September so you can choose a ministry early.

We are very excited to begin a new group for the

St. Francis Biblical School Certification with classes taught by either Fr. Mauro Muñoz or Fr. Max Rangel. The first group graduated last April and more will graduate in November this year. The program is three-years long and the participants are learning a lot about Scripture and their faith.

Another change this Fall is in the Theology Certification prgram with increased class hours from 20 to 30 per class and the sessions from 10 to 12 sessions. Also added are exams to verify that the participants learn the key concepts during this time. This fall Fr. Rafael Garcia, SJ will teach Introduction to the Social Doctrine of the Church (Spanish),

Marco Raposo will teach Introduction to Catholic Social Teaching (English), Fr. Rogelio Martinez will teach Sacraments (Spansih) and Manuel Barrios LBSW, MPS (English). After the promulgation of Bishop Seitz's beautiful and enlightening Pastoral Letter on Migration we are launching the Migration Academy taught by Dylan Corbett , Executive Director at Hope Border Institute.

Our mission at Tepeyac Institute is to share the mission of the Church with our baptized family as we are all called to do great things in the name of Jesus.

dos modalidades diferentes: dos noches entre semana por dos horas o los sábados en la mañana por cuatro horas.



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THE "EXPENDIBLE CHILDREN"

Couples struggle to get pregnant are turning with greater frequency to the in vitro fertilization (IVF) industry for assistance. In some cases, they can end up feeling they are "too pregnant" when twins, triplets or quads arise. This occurs from the practice of implanting more than one embryo at a time to improve pregnancy success rates. A multiplet pregnancy can involve significant risk, both for the children in utero, and for the mother. Because of these risks, the pregnant mother will sometimes be advised to opt for a "selective reduction," where potassium chloride is injected into one or two of the growing babies, to cause their hearts to seize, followed by death and the gradual re-absorption of their bodies during the remainder of the pregnancy. This can allow the one or more remaining brothers or sisters to grow more safely and avoid further complications during the pregnancy. Given the incredible effort expended by the couple to become pregnant in the first place, these lethal practices often draw gasps of disbelief from others.

A New York Times Magazine article from 2011 chronicled the saga of a woman who

selectively reduced her pregnancy from twins to a single. Even though she tried to not think too much about the two ultrasound shadows within her, she was forthright about her justification for doing it: "If I had conceived these twins naturally, I wouldn't have reduced this pregnancy, because you feel like if there's a natural order, then you don't want to disturb it. But we created this child in such an artificial manner — in a test tube, choosing an egg donor, having the embryo placed in me — and somehow, making a decision about how many to carry seemed to be just another choice. The pregnancy was all so consumerish to begin with, and this became yet another thing we could control."

Her devastatingly honest appraisal of IVF and the way it devalues the lives of children offers an important opportunity for reflection. When we take it upon ourselves to manufacture new human life in test tubes, it indeed becomes another "thing we can control," an object for our own willful manipulation, another means to realize our own goals. This "command and control mentality" over procreation sets up a glide path for us

to begin treating our own offspring like raw material, even tempting us to exercise an absolute, death-dealing dominion over them. As they are produced in the laboratory and transferred to the womb, our children can become an abstraction, mere pawns to be played in the end game of seeking what we want.

This attitude of seeing our offspring as expendable is becoming more widely accepted not only among IVF customers, but also among biomedical researchers themselves. In August, a highly troubling report was published describing the first successful editing of DNA in human embryos. The experiments were carried out in the laboratory of Shoukhrat Mitalipov at the Oregon Health and Science University (OHSU) and involved the generation of many dozens of embryos by IVF. The experiments utilized a new and highly precise DNA-editing technology called CRISPR-Cas9 to fix a defective, diseasecausing gene that some of the embryos carried. While research into understanding eliminating serious diseases is certainly good and praiseworthy as a goal, the techniques we employ

as we pursue good research goals need to be good as well. Doing evil that good may accrue, is, after all, still doing evil.

These research experiments

performed human embryos at OHSU were morally objectionable on a number of counts. If such genetically modified embryos had been allowed to grow up, there may well have been unintended effects from modifying their genes, unanticipated defects that they and future generations would bear. The problems and risks associated with this kind of "germ-line therapy" raise such serious concerns as to make it doubtful it should ever be attempted in humans. Even more distressing from the moral point of view is the fact that very young humans were treated not as ends, but as mere means to achieve investigative particular goals. They were created in laboratory glassware, experimented upon, their genes were tinkered with and they were killed and research dispatched as fodder into biohazard waste containers. The purported

darkness of medieval times was never as dark as the remarkable ethical blackness that is descending upon contemporary "enlightened" man as he exploits and destroys his own offspring.

Vigilance and care are required when dealing with vulnerable research subjects, and human embryos are among the most vulnerable of God's creatures, entrusted to us as our children, calling for stringent measures to ensure their protection and safeguard their human dignity.

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El Señor Obispo Intercede ante ICE para Mantener a Madre e Hija Juntas Mientras Combaten el Cáncer Juntas

Mark Seitz de la Diócesis de El Paso visito las instalaciones de ICE (Control de Aduanas y Migración), en un intento por detener la deportación de una madre cuya hija está luchando contra los efectos del cáncer. Menos de 24 horas más tarde. ICE concedió una estadía de seis meses de deportación a María Elena de Loera, concediéndole más tiempo para quedarse con su hija de 8 años. Alía está actualmente en tratamiento para un tipo raro de cáncer que ha afectado sus pulmones después de haber atacado también sus

Hace dos años, con sus hijos al lado, María llegó legalmente a

El día 7 de agosto, el Obispo la frontera huyendo de la violencia en Ciudad Juárez. Los elementos del crimen organizado allí habían extorsionado y amenazado la vida de su marido, al cual eventualmente asesinaron. Como sucede con la mayoría de los solicitantes de asilo mexicanos, que buscan refugio en El Paso, la solicitud de asilo de María fue denegada, pero se le dio permiso para permanecer en el país para atender las necesidades médicas urgentes de Alía.

A pesar de la condición crítica continua de su hija, ICE informó recientemente a María que su permiso para permanecer en los Estados Unidos por razones humanitarias se había terminado y que ella tenía que ser

deportada. La deportación para María significaría la separación de su hija y sus otros niños, o la eliminación del tratamiento de Alía de su tratamiento en El Paso "Children's Hospital". Este tratamiento similar no está disponible México desde el asesinato de su esposo, María es la única proveedora de sus

Después de enterarse de la situación de María y de su familia, el Obispo Seitz y miembros de la recién creada Comisión Diocesana sobre Migración, se pusieron en contacto con las autoridades locales de ICE pidiéndoles que revirtieran su decisión. El Instituto "Border Hope ", organización católica de apovo con sede en El Paso, trabajó con la abogada de María, Linda Rivas, del Centro de Inmigración de Las Américas, para llamar la atención de los legisladores federales y defensores de la inmigración.

La mañana en que María fue instruida para que informara a su oficial de deportación, el Obispo Seitz visitó a María y a Alía en el hospital. El Obispo pasó tiempo con la familia y oró por

la recuperación de Alía. Luego, acompañado por la Sra. Rivas y los sacerdotes de la Comisión Diocesana de Migración, el Obispo Seitz fue a las oficinas de ICE para abogar en nombre de María. A la mañana siguiente, María fue informada de la feliz noticia de que ella podría permanecer con su hija por otros seis meses mientras continúa el tratamiento.

Las acciones del Señor Obispo Seitz ocurrieron pocas semanas después de la publicación de su carta pastoral, "Sorrow and Mourning Flee Away", El Dolor y el Luto Huyen, en la que llamó la atención sobre las consecuencias humanas y morales de un sistema

de inmigración roto y el aumento de la militarización fronteriza. Después de conocer el resultado de su intervención para mantener a la familia de María unida, el Obispo dijo: "María y Alía son el rostro humano de un sistema de inmigración roto. Poner a una familia vulnerable en peligro es una cosa muy incorrecta de hacer. Como personas de fe y como estadounidenses, trabajar por unos sistemas de inmigración más justos significa asegurar que la compasión gane ante la














ST. RAPHAEL CELEBRATES ITS GOLDEN JUBILEE

St. Raphael Church was established in 1966 as a mission of St. Pius X after census revealed 800 Catholic families living in East El Paso. The first church, now the parish hall, was constructed in 1966. Fathers Ed Erzen and Bill Steffen served as pastors until the mission was decreed a parish on August 15, 1967 by Bishop Metzger. Rev. Richard J. Arlt was appointed the first resident priest in 1967. Bishop Peña dedicated St. Raphael Catholic Church on December 23, 1979. The St. Raphael Women's Guild, formed in March 1969, donated the handcarved wooden statue of the Blessed Virgin Mary that is in the church.

From the community's beginning, the religious formation program has worked to move children to know, love, and honor their Catholic heritage. The Adult Choir was formed in 1971 under the direction of Mary Maly Burdett. Since then, the Music Ministry at St. Raphael Church has grown to include various groups providing music at Sunday Masses. Other parish groups include the Knight of Columbus, Catholic Daughters of the Americas and St. Vincent de Paul. Several priests including

Monsignor A. Dixon Hartford, Father Robert Getz, and Father Stephen Peters have served the parish. In 1986, Monsignor Francis J. Smith became the pastor and was appointed Vicar General for the Diocese by Bishop Peña. Over the years, the congregation has grown from 400 families to more than 3,000 today. The parish, which includes a shrine for the unborn, is a strong advocate for the sanctity of life.

The beginnings of St. Raphael School date to 1967 when a preschool was opened at the parish for four-year olds. Mrs. Lilia Crow was the first teacher and remained at the preschool until May 1976. In September 1977, Mrs. Elizabeth Wiehe accepted the position of teacher. She built the school into one of the premier Catholic schools in El Paso first as teacher and then as principal beginning in 1990 until her death in 2011. In 1980 Pastor, Reverend Robert L. Getz, allowed the pre-school, which had existed since 1967, to be changed into a kindergarten. "Build for Tomorrow," was launched for the educational complex that was to be called St. Raphael School. In August 1986 the \$1.3 million building was complete. His Excellency, Bishop Reymundo Peña, assisted by Monsignor Francis J. Smith, blessed the building and officially opened the newest Catholic School in the El Paso Diocese.

In 2015, Bishop Mark J. Seitz appointed Rev. Anthony C. Celino pastor of St. Raphael as Father Celino continued his position at the Diocese as Vicar General and Moderator of the Curia. In 2016, Ms. Odette Yapor was appointed principal of St. Raphael School and continues as principal today.

This year, Rev. Msgr. Francis J. Smith, P.A. celebrates his 50th anniversary of his ordination to the priesthood. Msgr. Smith served as shepherd of St. Raphael Parish and School for 29 years. Msgr. Smith is better known for his humor, tenacity and intelligence. This year in honor of Msgr. Smith's 50 years of service to the Church, an endowed scholarship fund for St. Raphael School has been established in his name.

On August 15, 2017 St. Raphael Parish celebrated its 50th Anniversary mass presided over by Most Reverend Bishop Mark J.

The mass was broadcasted live on The Bridge 1150a, the only Catholic Radio Station for the Borderland. Concelebrating priests included Father Tony Celino, Father Cong Vo Father Stephen Peters. Monsignor Arturo Bañuelas, Father Gleen Carpe, Father Andy de Guzman and Father Richard Waiwood. A presentation to Monsignor Smith was made in the form of a plaque for his long time service to the parish and a \$10,000 donation was made to the Monsignor Francis J. Smith Scholarship Fund for St. Raphael School.

Arlene Boyle, Raphael's 100-year-old parishioner was also recognized during this mass for her long-standing service to this parish community. Arlene came to St. Raphael when it was a mission in 1966 and served in ministry up until this year when she completed her service as a St. Raphael's Health Minister. She says she remembers the first mass celebrated by Father Erzen in 1966. Boyle says, "I asked him if I could help him since he was doing it all by himself. Setting up the altar, getting the vestments out and all of that. I told him I can help

you." She said, "Father Erzen was so grateful and told her he would love for her to help." Proudly Mrs. Boyle proclaims, "Since that day I became the first sacristan that St. Raphael ever had." She recalls once serving to clean the parish hall along side her son. "I remember one time we had suspicions about the janitor drinking the wine so we marked it and checked it one morning and sure enough the janitor had been drinking it," Boyle said. The janitor was dismissed so my son took the job over for a while until we replaced the janitor. She says, "I felt bad for my son cause he was so skinny so I would help him." Her favorite memories of the parish were serving with Monsignor Smith was pastor. She says Msgr. Smith was always there for her. "I am so happy to be alive and be able to be a part of this celebration", says Mrs. Boyle.

Steve Maule, long time parishioner at St. Raphael since 1978 and former RCIA (The Rite of Christian Initiation of Adults) Director says, "St. Raphael is my spiritual family and includes a lot of people but in particular at the 8:15 a mass. They are second to my natural family. I would no more leave St. Raphael's because of my spiritual family than I would my natural family." Steve says RCIA at St. Raphael is what defines him. He believes RCIA is his mission and we strive to form Christ is a person's heart. He too remembers Msgr. Smith as a good faith leader but also as a very understanding one too.

Raphael's Anniversary motto is Remember, Worship and Believe. Father Celino's letter to his parish on this anniversary states, REMEMBER the service of so many great priests and deacons and the cooperation of countless lay faithful, who established the Parish Church and laid its foundation fully grounded in our faith in Jesus Christ. The Holy Spirit gathers us in this beautiful place to WORSHIP God and proclaim his message of salvation to all! We plant seeds of hope and firmly BELIEVE that the future generation of pastors, ministers and lay faithful of St. Raphael will carry on the message of Christ. La Iglesia San Rafael se estableció en 1966 como una misión de San Pío X., después de que el censo reveló que 800 familias católicas vivía ya en el Este de El Paso. 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


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A Year of Experiences

"It is important for families to be part of the seminary process and priestly life, since they help to reaffirm these and to keep them well grounded in reality. It is helpful for seminarians to combine time in the seminary with time spent in parishes. There they can have greater contact with the concrete realities of family life, since in their future ministry they will largely be dealing with families" (Amoris Laetitia 203). While the Pope's exhortation, Amoris Laetitia, is not primarily about seminary formation, it does insist on the importance of ensuring that seminarians receive a solid preparation for the priesthood outside of an institutional setting.

This year, three El Paso seminarians, will be responding to this calling from Pope Francis as they engage in a pastoral internship for an entire year. They will leave the security and stability of their seminary environment where many things have instantly been provided so that they may focus on studies and their personal development, and now they will have the opportunity that to ensure that others are provided for. While

parish priests are blessed with assistance from many members of their communities and from different hired services (in the case of higher income parishes), the priest must ensure that the bills are paid, that light bulbs are replaced when they are burnt out, that church facilities are clean and orderly, that faith formation is being imparted to the entire community, that the liturgy is celebrated in a dignified manner and that the word of God is prepared for others to hear, among many other things. Our three seminarians will participate in a year that transitions them, spiritually and practically, from spiritual sons to spiritual fathers. After a year of pastoral internship, they will return to their seminaries in Milwaukee, Wisconsin, Mundelein, Illinois, and Houston, Texas. Then, they will engage in their last years of studies with greater awareness of the ministry of the priesthood.

Within this experience, the seminarian is not released in isolation into a demanding and fast-paced environment of parish ministry. Instead, he is assigned to a pastor who will mentor him in the process. seminarian The pastoral

assignment is determined with great consideration for mentorship. The diocese desires that seminarian interns receive the proper balance between companionship and challenge. The priests mentors for this cycle of internships are Very Rev. Ben Flores (Blessed Sacrament Parish), Rev. Saul Pacheco (Our Lady of Assumption Parish), and Rev. Jose Cruz Longoria (West Texas Catholic Communities). There is great appreciation for the commitment and responsibility these priests have accepted as they receive, and accompany, a seminarian in their parish.

Ît is understood that the parish communities that have been selected as pastoral internship sites are communities of committed faith that will assist the seminarian in his process of becoming a priest according to the heart of Jesus Christ. As the people from these parishes interact with the seminarian they enrich him and are enriched by him. Seminarians are able to assist the poor in their parishes through participation in social justice ministries, they provide support and guidance to ministry groups, they visit the sick, and become part of very important moments in life of the people the of God. It is a joy for the parishioners of the selected parishes know that they have prepared future priest for the Diocese of El Paso.

Christus Alapini, who is originally from Benin, Africa and who is currently studying Houston, will be

assigned to serve in the West Texas Catholic Communities seated in Pecos, Texas. Ivan Montelongo, who is originally from Chihuahua, a graduate of Socorro High School in El Paso and currently studying at Mundelein Seminary near



LIFE IS A WORKABLE, PRACTICAL, WORTHWHILE PLAN

Early this morning, I sat outside in the coolness and enjoyed the medley of plants growing in my garden. Dainty white flowers sprinkled their fragile beauty along green stalks. Yellow, orange and maroon Mexican hats danced in the breeze. I happily sipped my coffee, delighted that so many of the assorted wildflowers had survived their unexpected trauma.

In July, I shared with you this intriguing gift from my son. Not a bouquet of flowers but a carpet of wildflower seeds which after weeks of diligent care had resulted in just a few tiny green sprouts. But over the next few weeks, the garden bouquet began to thrive. Each flower's appearance was cause for celebration. My garden bouquet was going to make it, and I had only provided the soil in which the seeds could grow, the nutrition of daily watering, and the time the seeds needed to develop into mature plants.

However, an emergency called us away from home and there was not enough rain to provide the plants' needs. We returned home to a plot of shriveled, brown twigs. How sad to see wilted petals of once lovely blossoms and withered stems of what had been leafy green plants. Someone remarked that the seeds were probably not viable so they would not have lasted anyway. Not viable? What does that mean? Dictionaries define the term "viable" as able to live and grow such as a plant. Dictionaries describe "viable" as something, such as an idea, design, or plan, that is feasible, practical, workable, possible, achievable, useful, attainable, doable, or worthwhile.

According to dictionaries, wildflower garden was definitely viable from its very beginning as a carpet of seeds. The seeds already had the blueprint imbedded within them to grow and develop. It was practical and achievable, as evidenced by the seeds growing sturdy stems, sprouting green leaves, and blossoming with delicate flowers. The only problem was that we had taken away the water - we had removed the part that allowed it to be feasible and possible for the plants to grow and continue living. It did not change their viability, the lack of water simply killed what had once been viable.

Similarly, the definition of "viable" gives an interesting twist when referring to a preborn child. A seed is viable with only soil and water. An idea is viable with appropriate resources and time in which to develop. In the same way, from the moment of conception a preborn baby has the blueprint or plan for development and growth, and he is viable with the appropriate time, nutrition and a place to grow. Those are the same requirements for the flowers in my garden - time, water, and soil. But a preborn baby is not judged as viable until he or she has reached the stage of development to be considered capable of living outside the uterus.

In the case of a child, the term "viable" actually refers to scientific progress, not the ability of the child to live. A hundred years ago an infant born prematurely would not be expected to live.

Today, we have the technology to imitate the same normal location in which a preborn baby thrives and to allow the baby to continue his or her development until mom and dad can take over from scientific advances and bring the baby home.

At conception, the baby has the blueprint or plan to develop everything needed for a healthy life. Without any extra resources, the preborn baby travels through

the fallopian tubes to implant in the lining of the wall of the mother's uterus. So, the baby has planted himself in the rich soil needed to continue developing. Nutrition is provided to the child without the mother needing any different resources to sustain the child's life than she herself needs. A preborn child requires less to continue living, growing developing than compared to the additional resources required for most ideas or designs.

No one capable of living without the basics of nutrition, time, and a safe place to live. Not a healthy adult, not a teenager, not an infant and not a preborn baby. Viability is defined by scientific advances, not the developmental stage of the preborn child. With time, a safe location and nutrition, the preborn child is viable from the moment of conception. He is

already alive, growing, developing and thriving.

Also growing is my garden which makes me smile. Before returning to the house's air-conditioned coolness, a safe location against the rising heat, I took one more look at the flowers blooming in the garden.




